Inquiring Minds Want to Know: Ash Wednesday Origins

Did you know that this *Ash Wednesday* tradition was not always the way we understand and practice it today? In the earliest days, ashes marked on the forehead of believers were not given to everyone but were given only to the biggest sinners; a punishment for those committing the most grievous infractions. Thus, ashes were reserved for these *public penitents* as they were brought before the community for "shaming."

Think Hester Prynne in Nathaniel Hawthorn's *The Scarlet Letter*, who in a Puritan Boston, Massachusetts in 1642 was required to publicly wear a scarlet-colored letter "A" on her dress. This was a way of shaming her for giving birth to a baby out of wedlock. The "A" on her dress is presumed to stand for adulteress.

Thus, in the original context of wearing ashes, only the most notorious sinners were marked publicly with a sign of their disgrace. But as time went on, as if creating jealousy, the ritual got the attention of others in the church who wanted to publicly show their humility as well. "Hey, how come they get ashes on their head? I want ashes on my head too!" Thus, with a desire to outwardly show penitence, other "sinners" began asking that they, too, might be marked as sinners. In the end, the number of penitents eventually grew so large that the imposition of ashes was extended to everyone in the church. And that my friends, is how this whole Ash Wednesday thing got started.

Historically, Roman Catholic churches initiated the annual ritual of imposing ashes on their foreheads as a liturgical practice to begin the Lenten season and it has been adopted by many Protestant churches as well. However, only about half of the congregations I've served have actually established it as a church tradition. So, whether you choose to participate in the ash custom or not, the symbolic nature of the ritual has become a sober reminder that "from the ashes (earth) we come, and to the ashes (earth) we will return."

February 14 marks the beginning of yet another Lenten season and we will be offering an Ash Wednesday service of "reflection" with music, liturgy, and the word. Worship, which will include a special anthem by the choir which will be at 7:00 p.m.

We wish you a blessed Lenten journey as you begin the walk toward new life and the glory of the Easter event.

Let's Talk Church P. 2 – Saturday, March 9 (9:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.)

To refresh your memory, *Let's Talk Church* is a project designed for the purpose of coming together with fellow church members to engage in times of reflection and dialogue on matters impacting the present and future of St. Paul's Church.

As we continue to engage in the process, we have the opportunity to prayerfully consider the many ways in which we can be the kind of church that can best serve the people who belong, the community in which we exist, and the wider United Church of Christ. In short, to reflect on how we can best work together with others to become a more just, generous, vibrant, and vital church. The benefit of this project is that it will help in making the church even more attractive to those ministerial candidates who may be interested in applying to serve as the settled pastor.

Let's Talk Church Part 2 is set for Saturday, March 9, beginning at 9:00 a.m. with coffee and sweets, a time to lunch together, and will wrap up by 2:00 in the afternoon. We are happy that the Rev. Shernell Edney Stilly, associate conference minister for churches in transition, will be spending the day with us. She will offer her perspective on the "state of the church and ministry" from her middle adjudicatory position and will engage us in some thoughtful dialogue. As we delve into some of the issues impacting mainline churches and how we move forward with a sense of hope, she will help us continue to "reimagine" the how's and what's of parish ministry in light of the many cultural shifts happening around us; shifts that we can no longer deny the existence of.

Additionally, Rev. Shernell will offer an overview of the search process which includes the formation of a search committee and putting together our church profile. So much of what we have been discussing will be key to that process and will help us present ourselves as a vibrant and open-minded congregation to potential candidates; willing to "adapt" and embrace the changes necessary to remain relevant as a local church.

One of the takeaways from our first retreat included the formation of ad hoc teams whose purposes is explained below. Our itinerary on March 9 will include time for those various teams to meet and discuss our roles as well as the necessary action needed to move forward. These lists are not exhaustive as we hope for additional names to be added as well as the input from those who were unable to attend.

Below is a description of each team and the names of those who thus far have expressed their interest in assisting. Anyone wishing to be added to any of these teams, please notify Lena or anyone on the planning team.

<u>Transition Team</u> (Ruth Costello, Wendy Manser, Pastor Bob)

Purpose: To join Ruth, Wendy, and Pastor Bob to oversee, explore, and develop a plan for moving forward with follow up steps in this important work of reimagining the church and how we can be intentional in living into it.



<u>Let's Talk Church continued</u> – Saturday, March 9 (9:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.)

<u>Church Governance</u> (Nancy Bellis, Sheryl Gee, Jennifer Good)

Purpose: This team will evaluate our present governance structure and do the necessary research to be able to make a recommendation to the council and congregation for action and implementation.

<u>Asset and Property Management</u> (Kevin Kruse, Jane Dawson, Gary Gee, Linda Kranz, Ken Hansen, Cheryl Treifenbach, Becky Berghorn)

Purpose: Stewardship ministry is also brick and mortar and includes question about how we can better utilize our buildings and grounds. This team will work with our current buildings and grounds committee for the purpose of evaluating our property and explore ways that we might encourage more usage (establish community partners) and to consider potential revenue in the process.

<u>Creation Care Team</u> (Linda Tickner, Bev Tychsen, Nancy Schmitz)

Purpose: This team would help to educate and prioritize our church's efforts to "go green" in as many ways possible, and to help individuals and families become better stewards of God's world, and to advocate for better practices in promoting sustainability.

<u>Open and Affirming Feasibility</u> (Nancy Bellis, Jane Dawson, Ruth Costello, Dana Sideris, Marianne Deacon, Debbie Patterson, Cathy Schmidt)

Purpose: This team would meet to prayerfully discuss and determine whether St. Paul's Church is a good candidate for engaging in the year-long ONA study provided by the United Church of Christ. The work of this task force would be to ponder the message on our church sign that reads "all are welcome." Ultimately, the team will make recommendations to the council and the congregation (with feedback) whether to proceed with the process or not. This would **not** be a decision to become an open and affirming church but merely the process of determining whether we want to begin the conversation.

The planning team for *Let's Talk Church* is Wendy Manser, Ruth Costello, and Pastor Bob. Feel free to contact one of them is you have questions or ideas. As with anything crucial to church life, we always welcome your prayers.



Movie Watch Party #2 - Amistad (March 3 after worship)

Please consider joining Pastor Bob for another movie watch party; Steven Spielberg's, *Amistad*. The story that inspired the film actually has historical connections with the UCC.

Synopsis: In 1839, 55 Africans who had been captured in the slave trade struck out for their freedom while being transported out of Havana, Cuba, on a schooner called La Amistad. The captives successfully took over the ship and ordered the crew to sail back to Africa, but weeks later the ship ended up far north, at the tip of Long Island, New York. U.S. officials boarded the ship, arrested the captives and jailed them in Connecticut.

While President Martin Van Buren sought to extradite the Africans to Cuba to pacify Spain, they were befriended by Christian abolitionists, many belonging to churches that are now part of the United Church of Christ. This group of abolitionists was led by Lewis Tappan, Rev. Joshua Leavitt and Rev. Simeon Jocelyn, raised money for their legal defense, including former President John Quincy Adams, arguing that they had been illegally captured and imported as enslaved workers.

The case was appealed all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, which declared the captives free in 1841. This abolitionist victory helped create momentum for the formation in 1846 of the American Missionary Association. This interracial agency's work in education, discipleship and justice eventually became part of the national mission structure of the United Church of Christ which continues to this day.

We will gather after the worship service on Sunday March 3. Once again, we plan on ordering pizza to be delivered directly to the church. No need to sign up in advance, just show up and enjoy the fellowship and discussion in the lounge.
